# SECONDARY NEWS

It's been a very different week in Secondary as our students and teachers adapt to our new school environment. After a long time without our students seeing their friends, it's challenging for them not to be able to interact as they normally might. No contact sport and minimal interaction in Performing Arts are just two examples of activities in which teachers and students have had to change the way they work. However, this shows huge resilience and adaptability at a difficult time. For example, Grade 6 and 7 had been working on some performance pieces before we went online. On our return to school, the students were still eager to continue working on their tasks so Mr Jackson has been able to use their work as a reflection exercise; the students are being asked to think about how a dramatic performance is affected if the element of physical interaction is taken away.

And this type of flexibility is happening across the whole Secondary School. Instead of using the whiteboard, teachers might share a Google Doc with students so that everyone can collectively share ideas. "Group" work has to be managed at a distance. Our classrooms have been opened out as much as possible using rooms with adjoining doors to allow each student to sit separately. All this is being done in addition to keeping classrooms clean, making sure students are keeping their distance while moving around school and monitoring hand washing throughout the day, with a 'checklist' form for this in every teaching space.

So it's been a strange week in a lot of ways, with a lot of 'firsts' - I, for one, have never collected IGCSE coursework wearing a mask and gloves! But I'll happily accept all of those new measures if it means being able to see the students on campus again. We've all learned a lot this week and continue to adapt our practices to ensure everyone's safety and wellbeing. A huge thanks to our students for just being able to get on with it all, and to all our staff for their amazing energy this week.



# DIVING IN AT THE DEEP END: GRADE 9 COMPLETE THEIR FIRST EXAM-STYLE ESSAYS FOR IGCSE LITERATURE

Over the last week, Grade 9 have been reviewing their work and understanding of Shakespeare's Twelfth Night in preparation for their first attempt at an IGCSE literature exam question in June. We've already looked at how we plan, draft and edit a literary essay, but of course this is always more tricky under the time constraint of the exam. While we weren't able to interact using our usual go-to activities such as mind mapping together on posters or huddling around the whiteboard, the class worked interactively on our Google Drive to plan essays and share ideas. To gain confidence in planning essays in timed conditions, students worked in the style of a "quick fire round" with questions read out at random followed by a few minutes of furious typing to note down all their ideas on a shared document. What did we learn from this exercise? That it's not always possible to write down everything we know, but that we can be selective in the key points we want to make. Less really can be more - as we always say, it's quality rather than quantity that counts!
