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

# Museum

"Because we're able to disengage from the outside world a bit, our minds can travel new paths and help us to gain new perspectives," explains psychologist Katherine Cotter from the University of Pennsylvania and co-author of a new research exploring positive emotions. "We might lose track of time or find ourselves absorbed in a particular work during our visit. In our everyday lives, we probably aren't having these sorts of experiences too often, so in this sense it makes the museum a unique space. Through these forms of immersion, we may boost our positive emotions or feel a bit more alive," explains Cotter.

Mr Santos, ISCS Art teacher, takes our students to various museums several times a year. This time our students spent the day in Kunsthaus Zug. If you are interested in the results of the visit, follow @de.a\_r - an instagram account dedicated to student art.

The Kunsthaus Zug has several collection areas, ranging from classical modernism to contemporary art. It is home to the most important collection of Viennese Modernism outside of Austria in Europe, including works by Klimt, Gerstl, Hoffmann, Kokoschka, Schiele, Wotruba. Four to five projects a year are dedicated to contemporary and 20th-century art with a targeted inclusion of public space.

"Project Collection", a unique collection model of contemporary art, was developed, which turns the museum into a "laboratory".

### **Meet Giorgia**




ISCS-led NGO plays an important role in our school. It organises events to support people in need and teaches students about social responsibility and activism.

### Tell us something about yourself:

I am from Bristol in the UK. I earned my degree in Mathematics and Education from the University of Plymouth, specialising in Physics and the teaching of Mathematics in mixed ability groups. Whilst in the UK, I worked for three consecutive years as the Welfare Officer of a large international summer school in Cambridge, which gave me the opportunity to work with staff and students from all over the world. I joined the School Group in 2016 in our sister school, Sage College, where I taught in both Primary and Secondary, including IGCSE and A Level Mathematics and A Level Physics. I worked as the Head of Mathematics at Sage College for two years and continue this role remotely, whilst also transitioning into the ISCS team as Head of Mathematics.

### Why have joined ISCS?

In August last year, I was lucky enough to come to ISCS to help out for a few weeks. During that time I absolutely fell in love with the staff and students here at school.
