I would like to wish everyone a lovely weekend.



What a fantas
Year 5. The coincredibly has and creativity

What a fantastic few weeks it has been in Year 5. The children have been working incredibly hard, showing great resilience and creativity.

English lessons have been full of wonder as we began exploring portal stories. After the magical visit from the fairies, the class now know that portal stories usually begin in an ordinary, rather dull place, before an everyday object transports the character to a magical world. We have enjoyed extracts from The Chronicles of Narnia, Harry Potter and our class text The Land of Roar. The children have even learnt a text off by heart, complete with actions, and are now ready to create their very own out-of-this-world fantasy stories.





In Maths, the children have been learning about place value, including decimals up to two places. They have tackled some very tricky word problems with determination and I am very proud of the way they have risen to the challenge.

The children have been learning about life cycles in science. This has included observing changes over time by hatching triop eggs and growing their own runner beans. They have compared the life cycles of different living things and used data to make predictions about lifespans and how they relate to size. Their thoughtful observations have been a real highlight.








PRIMARY SCHOOL

We have been focusing on close observational drawing in art by studying the work of Carmen Hui. We have taken inspiration from her detailed style and the children have shown great skill in drawing what they can actually see, rather than what they think an object should look like, and the results have been wonderful.

As a class, we have been talking about what it means to be a good learner. We have learnt that good learners often "go into the pit" when they face something challenging. If learning is always too easy, it does not help us grow. Instead, by finding strategies to manage tricky feelings and by pushing through difficulties, the children are becoming more resilient and most importantly, they are discovering that they really can do hard things when they give it their best effort.















Outside of Year 5, Coding Club has been pushing the boundaries of what technology can do. They even "teleported ducks" using micro:bits. Although it seemed like magic, it was really the clever use of the radio function to send data from one device to another when the accelerometer detected a shake. They also created noise-ometers and thermometers, combining science, coding and creativity!




IGCSE & A Level Economics: Understanding the demand and supply in the market

So far, two deliveries have been made to the SDA (Soziale Dienst Asyl) of Canton Zug. Around four boxes of toys, twelve boxes and six bags of clothes (for babies, children, teens, women, and men), two bags of shoes, and school supplies have already been dropped off. More boxes are also ready to go to Caritas, as they do not meet the specific needs of the SDA.

The coordinators we met could not be more grateful for the generous donations in support of refugees and asylum seekers, and we are happy to join them in sending a warm thank you to everyone who contributed!

In this time of global uncertainty, the aim of the charity drive has not only been to collect donations but also to raise awareness about the situation of refugees and asylum seekers. While the school intended to celebrate Peace Day last Friday, the PO had the opportunity to meet the primary pupils during their weekly assembly. We explained what it might mean to be a refugee or an asylum seeker, how difficult it must have been to leave one's home country, embark on what is often a perilous journey, and finally arrive in a new country that feels so foreign, where nothing awaited them except peace and safety. We also emphasised how easy it can be for each of us to show kindness, compassion, and empathy through a small donation that helps others feel more welcome, supported, and seen.
